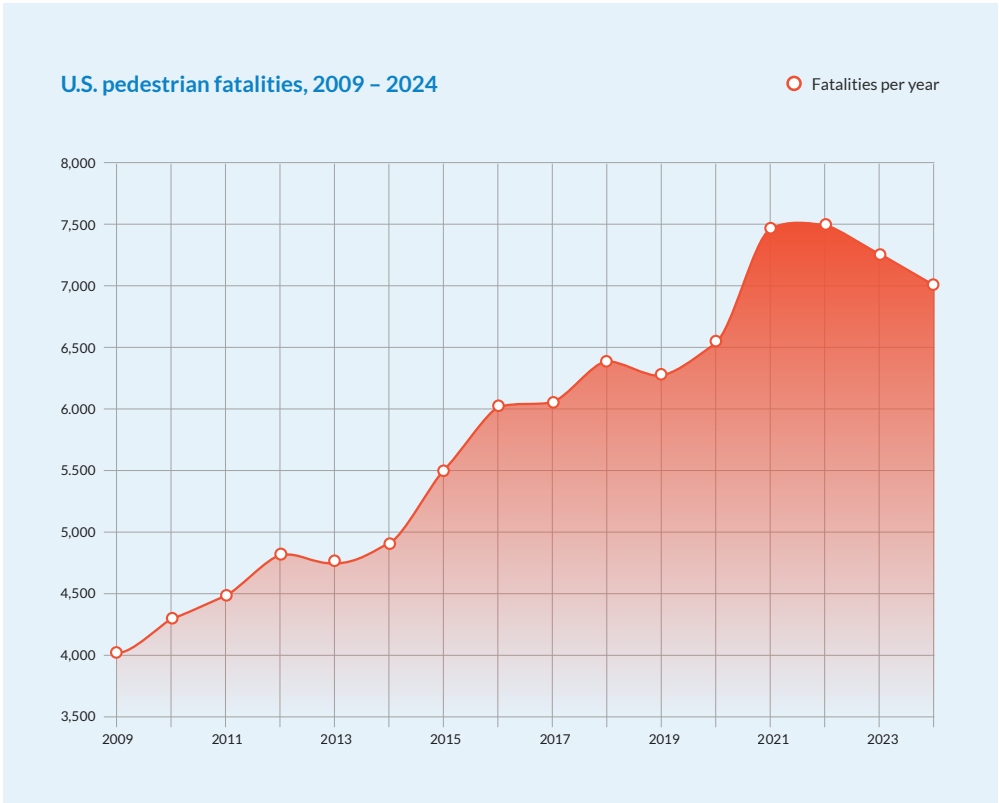

Taking Dangerous by Design to Congress

Despite recent small year-to-year decreases in the deaths of people walking, the 7,080 people struck and killed while walking in 2024 is higher than almost every year on record since 1982. If you take out the historic post-Covid highs from 2021–2023, the overall trend line continues in the same direction it has since 2009: upward. The celebratory press releases about this most recent small annual decline hide that we still have a long way to go: even if pedestrian deaths continue declining at the recent pace, we wouldn't reach 2009's modestly lower levels until 2042.



This crisis has unfolded in part because our nation's streets are dangerous by design, built primarily to move cars quickly at the expense of keeping everyone safe. **The crisis won't end until those in power—including members of Congress—finally make safety for all who use our roads a top priority.**

So what responsibility do members of Congress bear for what happens on the streets and roadways in our cities, counties, and states? And what can they do about it?

To help answer those questions, we looked at the crisis through an additional lens: congressional districts.

How we ranked congressional districts

This short addendum uses geolocation data to link all 2020–24 pedestrian fatalities to congressional district boundaries for the 120th Congress, which will be seated in January 2027. These boundaries include districts in the states that redrew their congressional maps before this year’s looming midterm elections.

We use 2024 five-year population estimates to calculate a pedestrian fatality rate and overall ranking for each district. Because district populations vary—from just under 550,000 people up to a little over one million—we rank districts by their fatality rate per 100,000 people rather than the total number of deaths.

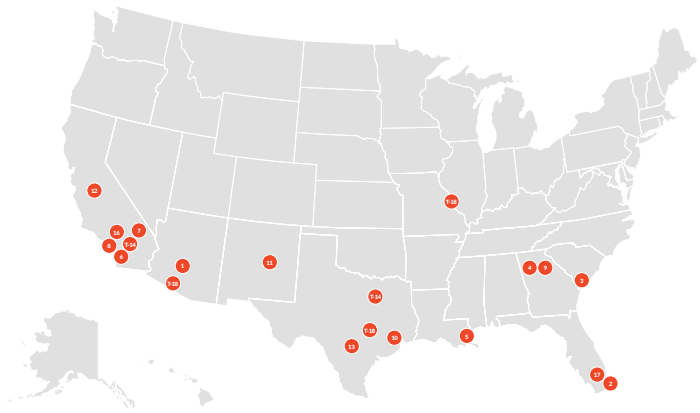
We hope advocates will use these findings to hold their representatives accountable for prioritizing safety, and that members of Congress will use them to better understand what is happening in their own backyards.

Key findings



One-quarter of pedestrian deaths occur in just 50 congressional districts

Though the top 50 most deadly districts represent just **11.5 percent** of all House districts, almost a **quarter (25 percent)** of all pedestrian deaths occurred in them.

In the top 50 most deadly districts, **8,779 people** were struck and killed between 2020-24, an average of 4.8 deaths per day. For comparison, just 1,452 pedestrians were struck and killed in the 50 least deadly congressional districts—an average of 0.8 deaths per day.

Many of the most deadly districts are in the most deadly states

Unsurprisingly, **32 of the 50 most deadly districts** are located in the top ten most deadly states, and all 20 of the most deadly metro areas in Dangerous by Design are represented to some extent within these 50 districts.

Neither party gets a pass

Democrats represent 39 of the 50 most deadly districts, compared with 11 represented by Republicans. Democrats represent more of the most deadly districts, but neither party should get a pass. Dangerous streets aren't a partisan problem. For decades, members of both parties have maintained a federal transportation system that sends billions of dollars to states without requiring measurable improvements in safety.

The most deadly district has a fatality rate far higher than the most deadly metro

Rep. Yassamin Ansari's district (AZ-03) is the most deadly in the country by both **fatality rate (7.94) and total fatalities (324 from 2020-24)**. The district fatality rate is higher than the #1 most deadly metro area (Memphis at 5.5 per 100k).

Although Rep. Yassamin Ansari's district (AZ-03) is the most deadly in the country by far, the bulk of this district falls within the Phoenix metro area, which was the **22nd most deadly metro area** in our rankings.

Half of the most deadly districts are from just three states

Three states stand out for having the most deadly congressional districts: **California with 10, Florida with eight, and Texas with seven**. Together, these three states account for **half of the 50 most deadly districts** in the country.

California (#8) and Florida (#5) also rank among the ten most deadly states overall.

Texas sits just outside of the top ten most deadly states (T-11th) and doesn't have any metro areas among the top 20 most deadly, yet seven of the 50 most deadly congressional districts are in Texas. Texas has not experienced a day without a traffic fatality (of any kind) for nearly 26 years, and in 2024, an average of 2.1 people were struck and killed while walking every single day.

Even states that are safer for pedestrians can be home to some of the most deadly congressional districts

Even the states that are doing well overall should be careful before claiming success. **Three of the top 50 most deadly districts are in states that rank in the bottom half nationally** for pedestrian fatality rates:

- Rep. Brendan Boyle's district (PA-02) is the **34th most deadly** congressional district, but Pennsylvania (#35) ranks in the bottom third of all states.
- Rep. Shri Thanedar's district (MI-13) is the **42nd most deadly** congressional district, while Michigan (#26) falls in the bottom half of all states.
- Rep. Andre Carson's district (IN-07) is the **48th most deadly**, while Indiana (#29) is in the bottom half of all states.

Atlanta's GA-05 district far outpaces its metro area

Although **Atlanta (#32)** is well outside the top 20 most deadly metro areas, Rep. Nikema Williams' district (GA-05), which includes most of the city and a sizable portion of the metro area, is the **4th most deadly** congressional district in the country.

The role of Congress

Members of Congress who care about safety should refuse to accept business as usual.

They have enormous power through their role in writing federal transportation policy, their oversight of how USDOT implements or fails to implement those laws, their influence within their state or state DOT, and their ability to go to bat for real, concrete changes proposed and executed by their local agencies.

Congress writes the laws that govern every federal dollar that states receive. But its members repeatedly forgo any binding requirements that would make agencies receiving the windfall of taxpayer dollars measurably improve transportation safety. They are the ones who decided there doesn't need to be any accountability for producing such terrible safety "results" that lag far behind those of almost the entire developed world. They are the ones who have enshrined our current federal approach to safety—or lack thereof—in law—defined largely by only a few small, difficult-to-access, and competitive safety programs that are a weak attempt to fix the problems perpetuated by the lion's share of the money that keeps building a network of roadways that are dangerous by design.

Congress should start by using its legislative authority to support only transportation legislation that rewards good safety performance and refuse to pass laws that impose no penalties for continued poor performance.





The current administration at USDOT has sought to undercut existing safety efforts by removing data-backed solutions from its websites, rescinding previously awarded grants to local communities, revising its roadway safety strategy to focus on nonsense like “reducing congestion,” and weaponizing the incredibly useful Safe Streets for All program to focus on things other than proven safety strategies. Congress should step up its active oversight of USDOT’s implementation of the law it passed in 2021, but moving forward, it should focus on producing the best possible federal transportation reauthorization in the next Congress and relegate the House’s BUILD America 250 Act to the scrap heap. Why? When you pass a bill that’s just more of the same, the results will follow. Congress needs to take this opportunity to start over and orient the entire federal program around safety.

Members of Congress also have a powerful bully pulpit and can take influential stands on proposed policy changes or projects to prioritize safety above all else. They can go to bat for the local street or transportation department that is improving safety by changing existing street designs—whether temporarily or permanently. They can back their local elected leaders when they make changes to prioritize safety for everyone, even when those changes make a small minority of people upset. They can help defend the use of proven, data-backed countermeasures in state or local street design to produce slower, safer streets. And back in DC, they can create consequences for those who continue to ignore safety and incentives for those who lead.

These rankings show members of Congress what is happening in their own backyards.

What matters now is what they choose to do about it. Members of Congress have the power to reorient the federal transportation program around safety above all else and prioritize the safety of the most vulnerable people.
